

toddler biting is more common than most people think. I am following the standardized procedures as prescribed. Here are some of those procedures (I'm actually doing much more):

- Provide duplicates of popular toys.
- Rotate toys, avoiding overstimulating.
- Provide soft areas: blankets, pillows, etc.
- Materials are at child-level to avoid frustration.
- Daily schedule is consistent and simplified.
- Provide sensory materials (different textures).
- Provide cause and effect toys and small collections for toddlers to carry around.
- Offer short nursery rhymes throughout the day.
- Give the children words to go with their feelings and model what empathy looks like.
